 Coulson Park tree T1001 – to consider comments received from a member of the public suggesting this tree should be pollarded.

Copy of the text of email received from a member of the public

Earlier today I walked through Coulson Park and along the path to Shirehall Moor and was very surprised to see four notices (if there were any more, then I missed them) attached to trees stating that they were to be felled. The four trees are:

1. Lime (not sure what type) close to the level crossing in Coulson Park.

2. Acer (probably a sycamore) opposite the playground.

3. Unknown species located just off the path to Shirehall Moor.

4. Apple tree adjacent to Dennis' bench at the far end of the Shirehall Moor path.

I'm guessing that the decision to fell these trees was taken with public safety in mind. However, I'm wondering if a less drastic course of action could be taken to save the trees and still make them "safe", such as selective surgery, reducing the crown and pollarding.

 I'm particularly concerned about the lime. It is a magnificent tree and of great amenity value guarding the southern end of Coulson Park. There are very few limes as good as this in Cornwall (maybe just two dozen). It is obviously damaged and affected by water ingress (but also a good habitat for fungi and invertebrates) but the crown looks in good condition. Could the two main stems be cut back, pollarded, to reduce the weight of the crown? The tree would regenerate and last for many more years. Even if the tree did not regenerate, a sizeable stump would provide a valuable habitat for wildlife and vegetation.

- To lose the acer (sycamore) would not be a great loss (I must admit I'm not a great friend of sycamores!). If it is removed completely then it should be replaced with a native species, such as rowan, field maple or, something more spectacular, a whitebeam. None of these are particularly tall trees, either.
- I don't know what the species is of the tree along the path, but
 I can't see it presenting much of a threat to the public as it is
 set back from the path. If it is really necessary to attend to the
 tree, then I suggest removing any branches that may be a
 danger and leave the rest of the tree as it is.
- I always wonder how that apple tree got to be there (did Dennis drop an apple core there?), so much so...... The tree does look in a poor state but rather than remove it completely the crown could be reduced significantly to leave a 2-metre high stump. The tree may regenerate or decay and provide valuable habitat as it does.

We are very fortunate that the Fowey Valley is nationally important for veteran and ancient trees and we should strive to keep all trees standing (and fallen) as long as the whole tree is not a danger. Yes, remove the dangerous bits but don't rip up the whole tree if selective pruning can remove the danger. I was horrified to see the damage done around the picnic tables along the path to Shirehall. The vegetation is re-growing but much was destroyed; my favourite spindle trees in particular.

I hope that alternative action to felling will be considered, especially so where the lime is concerned. It would be a tragedy to lose it.

Extract from the tree survey report on the tree

Observations


Very large old wound and cavity in mainstem at 2m to North east. Good strong inclusion growth however too large to enclose. Probe test shows little resistance to 30cm into a foul slime. Sounding hammer shows some hollowing at wound site and not lower, but suspect being full of water and sludge is preventing true picture. Tree forks at 3m with 2 clear and heavy leaders. 1 stem is weighted to the south and over the track. The main fork is very tight with included bark. No structural issues spotted in the crown, but the tree is weighted to the rail line to the west. There are several small but secure loose twigs.

Stem/limb decay. Exudates. Inclusive bark

Recommendations

Given the size of the cavity and the high-risk impact zones, combined with the structural probability of heart rot, the tree should be removed. It might be worth attempting to see how it responds to pollarding, which if successful would retain the tree for decades. Tree removal.

Timescale: 1 Year

Observations


Very sad looking crown, with few live buds. Water logging at base which appears continual after several visits.

Recommendations

Summer observations of crown health.

Update

There is a Horse Chestnut (Aesculus hippocastanum) T1049 to the west of the northern end, which is in very poor health. This was highlighted again in the initial report, and required a crown observation in the summer, which confirms that it is in serious decline. The tree is not unsafe, but is likely dying due to prolonged waterlogging. It sits in a depression which was underwater all winter, and the hot summer will have stressed it further. The simplest option is to remove this tree before it dies completely and then becomes unsafe.
